



# Amelanchier rotundifolia

## 'Edelweiss'



<b>Výška</b>	2-3 m
<b>Šírka</b>	2-3m
<b>Koruna</b>	broad ovoid, light, open crown
<b>Kôra a vetvy</b>	grey
<b>Listy</b>	green, silvery grey
<b>Jesenné sfarbenie</b>	Yellow, Orange, Red
<b>Kvety</b>	cream-white, flowers in April
<b>Plody</b>	edible fruits, blue, black
<b>Tŕne</b>	No thorns
<b>Jedovatosť</b>	Not toxic to humans and larger animals
<b>Typ pôdy</b>	Loamy soil, sandy soil, peaty soil, acid soil, calcareous soil
<b>Spevnené plochy</b>	tolerates occasional trampling
<b>Zóna odolnosti</b>	5a (-28,8 to -26,1 °C)
<b>Odolnosť voči vetru</b>	Good
<b>Ostatná odolnosť</b>	Resistant to cold (WH 1-6), resistant to wind
<b>Použitie</b>	trees in pots, roof gardens, small courtyards, patios
<b>Tvar</b>	Upright, spreading

Grows naturally as a shrub, but frequently grafted onto a stem in practice. The loose branching pattern produces an open crown. On emerging, the leaf has white, felt-like hairs on the underside, giving it a silver-grey appearance. These hairs disappear in the summer and the oval leaves are conspicuously grey-green. The autumn colours vary each year, but are usually a combination of yellow, orange and red hues. The creamy white flowers are strikingly large and grouped in dense racemes. The edible fruits are fairly small and blue-black. Amelanchier has few soil requirements but grows best in calcareous soil.
